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ASEAN Foreign Ministers' Retreat

Foreign ministers of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) have gathered for the ASEAN Foreign Ministers' (AMM) Retreat in Jakarta, Indonesia from 3 to 4 Feb 2023.

The two-day AMM Retreat was the first major meeting under Indonesia's Chairmanship of ASEAN in 2023, and the theme for this year was ASEAN Matters: Epicentrum of Growth.

Three significant issues were discussed at the meeting:



Timor-Leste the 11th member of ASEAN in principle

Timor-Leste attended this ASEAN meeting as an observer for the very first time, after being granted inprinciple approval for ASEAN membership. The ASEAN coordinating council's working group is in the process of working on the draft roadmap for Timor-Leste's full membership.



Myanmar

The situation in Myanmar is not getting better, and in fact, ground reports have

indicated that the situation may actually be worsening.

The ASEAN foreign ministers agreed that inclusive national dialogue is key to finding a peaceful resolution to the situation in Myanmar. While ASEAN will do its best to facilitate, encourage and promote national reconciliation, the meeting also emphasised that the rate limiting factor for progress is not ASEAN – it is really the stakeholders within Myanmar itself.

As Chairman of ASEAN in 2023, Indonesia said it has formed the office of special envoy to Myanmar led by their foreign minister as mandated by the Five-Point Consensus. Meanwhile, ASEAN will continue to be involved in delivering humanitarian assistance to the people in Myanmar.

The foreign ministers reaffirmed the importance of working together to facilitate an inclusive post-pandemic recovery and advance ASEAN's community-building efforts. Foreign Minister Vivian Balakrishnan emphasised that Singapore will work with Indonesia and fellow ASEAN member states to create opportunities for people and businesses in the digital, green, and blue economies:

- Digital economy To advance negotiations on the ASEAN Digital Economy Framework Agreement, by enhancing digital literacy in the population, improving digital connectivity between ASEAN countries, and enabling cross-border flows of data because that is an essential element of a digital economy.
- Green economy To decarbonise or at least reduce the carbon footprint of all our economies, and in particular, to help facilitate the transition towards renewable energy.
- Blue economy To have a sustainable, resilient approach to using, conserving, and developing our maritime resources.

Budget Statement 2023

On 14 Feb 2023, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Finance Lawrence Wong delivered Singapore's FY2023 Budget Statement in Parliament. He made these key points:



Moving Forward in a New Era



- We will need to adjust to this new era, reposition our economy, and refresh our social compact for the future.
- We build our collective resilience so that we continue to support one another, and bounce back stronger from external disruptions and shocks.



🙎 Refreshing our Social Compact

- DPM Lawrence Wong said that the Government has worked to update its policies based on feedback and ideas shared during the Forward Singapore (#ForwardSG) exercise.
- Among the views shared by Singaporeans were social mobility and equality, uplifting those with less, reskilling and upskilling to secure good jobs, as well as aspirations and concerns about raising families.
- To achieve these shared aspirations, the next phase of the #ForwardSG exercise will focus on more targeted engagements that "go deeper in specific issues" and on co-creating solutions with Singaporeans. The collective vision and recommendations will be shared in a Forward Singapore report in the second half of 2023.



Forward Singapore is organised along six pillars: (1) economy and jobs; (2) education and lifelong learning; (3) health and social support; (4) home and living environment; (5) environmental and (6) fiscal sustainability, each led by 4G leaders.



Our efforts to strengthen our overall resilience must reflect the values that motivate us as a people and as a nation. We want a Singapore where we not only do the best for ourselves, but also help our fellow citizens succeed. And that is how we keep Singapore strong, resilient, and united.

Total Defence 2023 -Together, We Keep Singapore Strong

This year's Total Defence (TD) theme is Together, We Keep Singapore Strong, and it focuses on the many ways TD is put into action in our everyday lives, as we deal with everevolving threats to Singapore.

Every Singaporean has a part to play in our daily lives to ensure that Singapore is prepared for crises or disruptions, and that we remain resilient and united.



From the Total Defence Sandbox (TD Sandbox)

To give Singaporeans more opportunities to share ideas on strengthening TD and to partner the government to implement these initiatives, the TD Sandbox was launched last year to crowdsource proposals from the public.

77 ideas were submitted to the TD Sandbox, of which four were selected:

1. TD Murder Mystery Role Play Game: Created by a pair of university students, it is an immersive social deduction game involving up to seven players, fashioned as a murder mystery exploring themes of evolving security threats which Singapore faces, such as terrorism and climate change.



3. Community Table-Top Exercise (TTX): The TTX was adapted from a proposal by a group of SMU students to conduct a table top simulation exercise to engage post-secondary students on TD. It aims to discuss the impact of pertinent contemporaneous issues affecting Singapore, and get individuals, communities and business owners to play their part during crises and disruptions through the development of community drawer plans.

Co-organised by Nexus, MINDEF and the grassroots organisations of Chua Chu Kang, Bricklands, Keat Hong, Gombak, and Hong Kah North, and with the support of various government agencies, educational institutes and businesses, the TTX was conducted across two days on 13 and 15 Feb 2023 at Choa Chu Kang Community Club, as part of the TD Day Commemoration Event 2023. Members of the local community came together to draw up plans to prepare for and respond to disruptions of essential supplies.

2. TD Trail 2.0: Designed by a team of Singapore Management University (SMU) students, the new TD Trail 2.0 takes the public to Singapore's eastern areas to explore sites related to TD, such as the NEwater Visitor Gallery and the Changi Chapel and Museum.













3. TD Tower Defence Game: Currently in the prototype stage, the game is designed and coded by a group of NUS High School of Math and Science students. It adds a TD-themed twist to the classic tower defence game, a popular subgenre of strategy games where players allocate resources to build towers to defend their territories against enemy attacks.

Minister for Defence Dr Ng Eng Hen was in Germany from 17 to 19 Feb 2023 to attend the 59th Munich Security Conference (MSC).

- At the Maritime Security Roundtable, he spoke on the topic "Bridging Troubled Waters - Mapping Escalation Potential in the Indo-Pacific Region".
 In his speech, he called upon leaders to work towards preventing miscalculation or inadvertent physical conflicts.
- on the sidelines of the 59th MSC, Dr Ng also spoke at the 14th Munich Young Leaders (MYL) Roundtable on the topic of 'Forging A Path To The World As We Hope It To Be'. At the session, he spoke about key global challenges and talked about three aspirational goals for the world: (1) to end oppression and marginalisation of different groups; (2) alleviate poverty; and (3) protect the fundamental rights of all citizens.




